Repair History / Additional Comments

This old warhorse came to me with very high action, strung Hawaiian. I did a neck reset and plays beautifully now. Original finish. Previous owner scratched his own "serial number" into back of peghead. Original cone; 4 holes on the bell with short arm spider that sits on the cone lugs. Would sound much fuller & louder with a new Beard cone & spider but I don't have the heart to replace this original 1930s cone that is working as it did when new. Lovely example of the standard Dobro-Regal from the mid 1930s. Grant MacNeill
